💽 🍍 COVID-19 Case Trends – Cases Decreasing

COVID-19 case rates are starting to decrease in Santa Cruz County. Public Health's surge response will focus on supporting the healthcare system, supporting the community with COVID-19 preparedness, and maintaining Public Health operations. Average number of daily new COVID-19 cases in Santa Cruz County in the last 14 days

The 14-day change graph to the right indicates a flattening and decreasing trend.

• Reproductive number median estimate is below 1, which indicates that transmission is not increasing.

Individual behaviors **DO** make a difference to **SLOW** the spread. What you can do during the **Omicron surge:**

- Get vaccinated and boosted.
- Upgrade vour masks.
- Improve ventilation and air filtration.

Masking Update

Bay Area health officers, in alignment with the State, strongly recommend continued masking as an effective tool to prevent the spread of the virus.
